President's Report 2025



Pastor Edwin Ewart

It has been a tremendous privilege to serve the churches of our Association this year as President. The role has involved chairing committees, meeting groups of elders, attending church induction events and preaching in quite a number of churches across the island.

My schedule has been busy and almost every Sunday I

have been on the road. The aim on every occasion has been to bring encouragement and I hope I have been able to do that as I have brought greetings and preached God's word.

Highlights of this year have been going back to Letterkenny and Coleraine (two of the churches I pastored) and renewing fellowship there. Visiting younger churches such as Blackrock and Keady was a real blessing, as was time spent with more established churches such as Knockconny and Moira. A very special event was a joint service for the churches in the Cork/Kerry area in October where 11 churches were represented with around 500 people in attendance. What a thrill to see what God has done since the days of the inception of the Cork/Kerry project. Alicen and I have also hosted a number of fellowship evenings throughout the year for pastors and wives to encourage them in the vital work to which God has called them. In March, the annual Pastor's Conference was held in Carlingford with a record number in attendance. The teaching and fellowship was great and this event was once again a reminder of what God has been doing among Irish Baptists through the leadership of his servants whom he has called and equipped.

In my visits to churches, I have taken the opportunity to remind them of two features which have characterised our churches over the years:

Firstly, doctrinal conviction, namely those evangelical beliefs found in Scripture and articulated in our doctrinal statement. These doctrines form the essential basis of our fellowship.

Secondly, evangelistic endeavour. Historically, Irish Baptists were known for their gospel passion and many of our churches were formed as the result of evangelistic outreach in their localities.

My abiding impression is that our churches today are maintaining their doctrinal convictions and their gospel focus as they reach out with the good news of the gospel. They are following the exhortations of Paul to Timothy in 2 Timothy 1:13 and 4:5 respectively, to `keep the pattern of sound teaching` and `do the work of evangelism`.

Finally, I want to say thank you to a few people who have helped to make this year a real blessing:

Firstly, to my wife, Alicen, who has accompanied me on almost every occasion and shared the driving! Her support has been invaluable.

Then to Dave Ramsey, the Association Director, whose servant leadership on behalf of our churches is outstanding in every way. His support and advice have helped to make this role a joy.

Finally, to the staff in the Baptist Centre, including all at IBC, who work so hard in the service of our churches, a big thank you!

In normal circumstances I would be handing over the reins now to the Vice-President but due to the illness of Pastor Neil Watson, I have been asked by the Executive Committee to carry on for another year. I therefore ask for your continuing prayerful support as I enter this second year of service as Association President.

Churches

The total number of churches in membership of the Association at the end of 2024 was 120 (2023, 119). It was a great delight and joy to welcome North City Baptist Church and Tullamore Bible Church into membership during the year. Sadly, the Mountpottinger church took the decision to dissolve. It was in the Mountpottinger building that the Baptist Union of Ireland was formed in 1895 with 27 churches. We give thanks to God for the faithful work and witness of the Mountpottinger church since its foundation in 1891. It is also encouraging to report that a number of churches have opened up discussion with the Association regarding membership.

In 1991 there were 101 churches in the Association. Over the period to 2024 we have added 33 churches balanced by 11 dissolutions and three resignations. In Northern Ireland there are 86 Churches. In 1991 there were 91. This reflects eight additions and 13 subtractions (resignation or closure). In the Republic of Ireland there were 10 churches in 1991 in comparison to 34 at the end of the year. This reflects 25 new churches and one closure over this period.

Statistics

The statistics for 2023 show a number of positive developments. See the table and explanation provided below.

Members

It is encouraging to see a significant increase in membership across the churches during 2024 for the second year running. Total membership has increased by 152 from 8,633 to 8,785 (1.8%). This is the third year of increases in membership. It is encouraging to see the small decline throughout the past decade being arrested and reversed over the past few years. **This membership figure represents the highest ever recorded membership in the Association.**

A closer investigation of the year-on-year movement by individual church shows that 50 (2023 – 55) churches (42%) experienced an increase in membership with 40 churches (33%) experiencing an decrease in membership. 30 churches membership remained the same. Given the large increase in membership and the spread of movements in churches it would appear that increases are weighted towards a small number of churches experiencing a large increase in membership. It is also very encouraging to note that one of the highest levels of those added to membership was achieved during the year.

Attendance

The figure recorded for Sunday attendance is 13,134 (2023 – 12,786). The marked fall in attendance during COVID has been fully recovered with this year end figure in excess of the 2019 attendance figure (12,826). Figures for Sunday attendance have only been collected since 2018.

Baptism

The figures for baptisms during the year is very encouraging with 374 (2022 – 335) individuals going through the waters of baptism. This is an encouraging sign that the levels experienced during COVID are being recovered. **This is the second highest number of baptisms in a year since the year 2000.** We must rejoice in this evidence of individuals coming to faith in Christ and being obedient to his command to be baptised as that public declaration of their faith.

Children and Young People

The number of children in children's meetings and young people attending our churches has experienced a very encouraging increase. **The figure for children attending our programmes is the highest since the year 2000.** The trend for

young people has experienced a steady increase since 2010. Both of these figures should be an encouragement and we need to continue to work hard at investment in these areas to ensure the continued growth of our family of churches.

Church leadership

The macro trend of the last 30 years of increasing elders in our churches would indicate that churches are placing a greater value on a plurality of elders providing spiritual oversight and servant leadership within our churches. **This figure recorded for elders is the joint highest in the history of the Association.** An increase in eldership would suggest that churches may be in a stronger and more stable position. It is encouraging to see a fourth year of increase in numbers of elders in our churches. It is further encouraging to also see a third increase in numbers of deacons in this past year. Churches need to have intentionality in developing leaders and passing on experience to faithful men who will teach others.

There were three resignations form the pastorate and five retirements during 2024. There were four pastors who moved church during the year. It was encouraging to witness five new pastors, and four inductions to other pastoral ministry roles within churches. However, this is a net movement in pastors of zero.

At the end of the year there were 24 vacant churches. However, when you take into account provision for pastoral cover the actual number of vacant churches is 20. Developing pastoral oversight for our churches needs to be a high priority for all our churches.

Baptist Aid

Zimbabwe continues to experience economic difficulties. The Baptist Union of Zimbabwe are seeking to demonstrate Christian love and compassion through its Orphan Care Programme. ABCI are delighted to be able to contribute to this project. However, we have reached a stage where we can only support at the level of donations received into the fund. This comes from a number of committed monthly donations but mainly through the Christmas appeal. During 2024 we were able to support approximately 80 children in the programme. Churches are urged to continue to keep the profile of this endeavour high in the minds of their members.

Retired Ministers' Support Fund

The RMS fund continues to provide a small income for pastor and missionaries that have served our churches. The Fund currently supports 23 members with 490 years of service. However it has now entered the final stages of its existence and expenditure should continue to fall in coming years. Income needs to be sustained at current levels for at least five years to meet current commitments and ensure the deficit is removed.

Churches' Pastoral Support Scheme (CPSS)

The CPSS supported 6 churches to the total sum of £32,120 during 2024. It was pleasing to know that the income level to this fund allowed 100% of the committed grants to be paid. The fund has had one new application during 2024 and giving to the fund needs to be maintained to ensure adequate support is giving to all churches in the Scheme. The CPSS remains a Scheme which in one of its incarnations over the last 100 years has provided support for the majority of our churches. The history of many large churches today will show they survived in their early years because of such support. This fund is a practical expression of the larger churches assisting smaller and weaker churches so that they might move forward and take new ground.

Pastors Conference

Well over 120 pastors, missionaries and youth workers attended the annual pastors conference in Carlingford, Co Louth in March 2024. This was a record number of attendees for the conference.

The guest speaker was Pastor Mark Dever from Capitol Hill Baptist Church, DC. The theme for the conference was the sufficiency of scripture. The first session was the sufficiency of Scripture in Preaching, the second session was on the sufficiency of Scripture in organising the church and the third session was on the sufficiency of Scripture in fulfilling the great commission. It was a delight to hear Mark "in the flesh" and many appreciated his relaxed style.



Some of the most precious times at the conference are those spent in prayer or in small groups. This gives the pastors opportunity to discuss the challenges and privileges of ministry and to encourage one another. Those who attended went away refreshed and already looking forward to and planning for next year.



Ministry Support

Over the past year ministry support has been involved in connecting with pastors, providing counselling to a range of people, supporting churches, giving direction in evangelism and pastoral care, teaching at the college and preaching around our churches.

Supporting Pastors

Much time is spent with pastors for coffee and a chat. The conversations include general church issues, personal struggles, leadership struggles, pastoral care questions and evangelism or discussion around future vision.

A number of pastors, pastor's wives and pastor's children have received more formal counselling to support and help them through difficulties. In total, approximately 65 pastors have been regularly contacted.

Supporting Churches

Throughout the past year the opportunity has arisen to come alongside and support many local churches in several ways. Sometimes it is speaking to elders or deacons about a particular issue they need advice on. Over the past year teaching series have been delivered on the topics of evangelism training, mental health issues, pastoral care in churches, to name a few. Material has been delivered at evangelistic events around our churches, and it has been a joy to see people coming to faith through those meetings. Teaching on evangelism and pastoral care and counselling has also been delivered at the Irish Baptist College.

Counselling

The main bulk of counselling comes from referrals from our churches. Over the past year 50 people have been supported in the counselling room. This usually means between 6-10 sessions per person. Occasional help is also given to several charities including Niamh Louise Foundation, Recover together (addiction recovery with Roy Warke), Bridge Counselling, Fresh light Counselling and Hope4U.

It is a great privilege to come alongside so many people and bring practical and biblical support. It is a joy to see lives change, individuals recover, churches strengthened and pastors rediscovering their joy in ministry.

Media & Communications

Since commencing the role in September 2023, serving as the Media and Communications Coordinator for ABCI has been a tremendous privilege. In particular, it has been a joy to work alongside the various department directors, supporting their efforts and helping to promote the valuable work they do across our churches.

A key aspect of the role has been creating photo and video content that both enhances the objectives of our various departments and also promotes the many ongoing ways in which they are serving our Association - particularly online and through our various social media channels.

Some of the ongoing projects include the production of the Irish Baptist College podcast, 'Let's Talk'. This podcast is released weekly and seeks to educate listeners on practical and theological issues, giving outsiders and insight into the work of our college. In addition, work continues alongside the Missions Department in anticipation of Peru 100 - an important anniversary as we commemorate 100 years of Irish Baptist gospel interest in Peru. In the last 12 months we have recorded dozens of interviews with key people who are able to testify to God's grace over these years.

These two projects, among many others, have highlighted the continued appetite from our department directors to implement the use of media into their ministry strategy in the coming years.

Additionally, there have been many invitations to speak at churches from across our Association. Some of these engagements have been with a direct focus on how Christians should approach media and technology. Others have been to speak at Sunday services. Regardless, these opportunities provide opportunity to share about the Association's work firsthand and encourage churches in their partnership together.

It has been a rewarding year and we look forward to developing further ways to support the work of our Association.

Baptist Missions continues to reach out in France, Ireland, Peru, and Spain. We give thanks for the people God has raised up to work in each of these countries, for grace and strength given when the going is tough and for evident signs of His blessing as people have come to faith in the Lord Jesus, been baptised and joined local churches.



The work we support in France is located in Bram, Marseille and Paris.

The Sandalls are now settled in **BRAM**. They continue to make real progress with the French language, they are integrating more into the church in Carcassonne and their three girls have made great friends in church and school. They have managed to get a regular English-speaking Bible study going again and were really encouraged when a young man from Argentina trusted the Lord over the summer.

Laetitia Anstett has been able to take new opportunities in MARSEILLE and while it has been harder to reach the children in the area in 2024, a light party in October was encouraging, with parents and children attending and an opportunity to share the gospel. There have been real encouragements also with individuals coming to lunch time Bible studies with Bibles and other literature being accepted. The challenge of reaching neighbours from a variety of backgrounds remains.

Philip and Rachel Moore commenced gospel outreach in centre of **PARIS (5th arrondissement)** in 2023. Twenty individuals have now committed to help in this new church-plant, including a full-time women's and children's worker. They are looking to

the Lord for a suitable premises to begin services in 2025 and have been encouraged to see individuals put their trust in the Lord Jesus during the past year.

We were delighted when **Kirsty Lyttle**, a student from the Newtownbreda Church, was able to serve short-term in France last summer, with Laetitia (camp in Alsace) and with the team in Carcassonne.

A small group of young people from the Grosvenor Road Church also visited the Sandalls and the Carcassonne context last summer to get a small taste of what it is like to live and work in France and so be better informed in their prayers.

In August, the **Livingstone** family moved from Baptist Missions to a different mission organisation (based in the U.S.). They continue to serve in church-planting (Bort-les-Orgues) and at a camp centre in Larrode.



Evan and Rachel Bachtold are actively involved in the community in **VIRGINIA**, through basketball, music and other activities. In partnership with the Cavan church, they hope to establish regular services there in 2025.

Staying in Ulster, **Colin and Debbie Gervais** have been encouraged by ongoing opportunities along the Fermanagh/Monaghan border. The weekly Bible study in **CLONES** is going well and they hope to possibly begin monthly services in the town in September 2025.

Len and Joyce Keys have seen real evidence of the Lord at work in **CLOGHER** as people have come to faith in the Lord Jesus. People are gathering around the Bible on a Sunday morning and there are exciting plans to develop the work further in the years ahead.

John and Grace Cunningham continue to work with the Armagh, Keady and Newry churches in **CROSSMAGLEN** and other areas in South Armagh. Regular door to door visitation has been encouraging, and individuals from the town have started to come to the weekly Bible study in the community centre.

Moving to Munster, **William and Yvonne Kidd** had a busy but blessed year in **WATERFORD** as numbers of regular attenders increased. Another team from the Moira Church in July were a real blessing and more local people came along to the carol service at Christmas. They still need to find suitable, affordable housing to live in longer term.

Paul and Kate McFarland had an encouraging year in **YOUGHAL** too. Towards the end of the year, they had two local men nominated for eldership and the Bible study in Lismore has been going well throughout the year.

Sam and Lucy Urey (Hamilton Road) commenced an initial two-year placement working with the Limerick Church. Sam is serving as a Community Outreach Worker in **LIMERICK**. They have settled well into the Castletroy area and are heading up the "Crossway" evening meeting in a local community building. There is huge gospel need in the city and county.



Just twenty miles north of Limerick, **David and Afaf McConville** were delighted to get the Amazing Journey into schools in **NENAGH** and other opportunities to sow gospel seed in the area throughout the year. Leadership can be very lonely. Like many churches in the Republic, having another elder or two would make a real difference in this and other places. **Peter and Payton Carrigan** (Hamilton Road) have been serving alongside the **PASSAGE** church for the past two and a half years as church-planting interns with Baptist Missions. They are looking to the Lord in relation to their long-term future as their three-year placement ends in August 2025. They are expecting their first baby in May 2025.

Challenges

Dublin will have a population of over two million people by 2050, if the Lord has not returned. That is the same number of people as live in Northern Ireland at present, where we have eighty-six churches. There are eight Baptist churches in the greater Dublin area (if we include Balbriggan and Brannockstown). There are several large suburbs in Dublin with little gospel witness.

Over the past 25 years we have partnered with the Grosvenor Road and Jamestown Road churches to see Ballycullen (2004), Blackrock (2019) and North City (2023) churches planted. The **Blackrock** church is moving steadily towards becoming self-supporting and the **North City** church has begun to take on some financial responsibility. The exorbitant cost of housing in Dublin and throughout the Republic is going to be a huge challenge in placing gospel workers in the future. There are towns and suburbs in other cities too with little or no gospel witness.

Change

Towards the end of 2024, after several years of prayer, discussion and meetings, the Ireland Committee unanimously took the difficult decision to end our involvement on the Shankill Road. This means that in 2025, we will be seeking to find a new ministry location for **David and Pamela Dickson**. After 16 years of providing personnel and resources for the work at Shankill Community Fellowship, the committee believes that this is the right step to take. Pray for God's clear direction for David and Pamela in the months ahead.



The work in Peru has transitioned smoothly into Peruvian leadership. In answer to decades of prayer, the churches are now leading the work of evangelism and church-planting and directing the ministries in the camp centre, radio station and seminary. The

Association of Evangelical Baptist Churches in South Peru will be 10 years old in 2025. Recently they appointed pastor **Jimmy Huamani** as the new Director of the Seminary (commencing his post on January 1st, 2025). A new church-plant is also taking shape in the '10th of May' area (a district on the outskirts of the growing city of Tacna). Camps in



January went very well. The camp centre at Ite is being used by more churches and the radio station is moving forward under the leadership of a working team appointed by the churches.

John and Lourdes Brew fully retired in June 2024 (John had been serving in a part-time capacity since June 2022). John does continue to teach in the Seminary and preach when invited.

Still supporting

We will continue to support the work in Peru, both practically and prayerfully until the point where the work is self-sustaining, but it is a real joy to see how God has raised up a generation of godly and gifted Peruvian men and women to reach their own people with the gospel. We long for the day when the churches in Peru send out a missionary to serve in Spain. One of the ways our churches have been showing their support for Peru this year has been by participating in the What a Di-Llama Sunday School project organised by Baptist Youth.

Toward 2027

Tracy Ellison began her part-time role as Project Administrator on February 1st, 2024. Tracy is helping Baptist Missions plan for two big anniversaries in 2027. 2027 marks the 100th anniversary of missionary activity in Peru and it will be 50 years since the Irish Baptist Home Mission and the Irish Baptist Foreign Mission merged to form Baptist

Missions. We are planning a double celebration as we mark both **PERU100** and **BM50**. Tracy has been working very hard; reading, researching, planning, interviewing and Matthew Campbell (Media Co-ordinator) has been busy recording interviews and editing material. We hope to produce four short videos to give an overview of God's faithfulness in Peru over the past 100 years. We have also established an ad-hoc **PERU100** team of people who are helping voluntarily as we press forward to mark this anniversary in a significant way.

SPAIN

Moving forward

Andrew and Ruth Reid are encouraged that the LA **GARRIGA** church-planting project continues to move forward. La Garriga is a town next door to the town of

L'Ametlla where they live, both with no Bible believing church. Unbelieving friends attended different Christmas events. Pray particularly for Ruth as she builds on friendships old and new and takes opportunities to spread the gospel. Meanwhile, in his day job, Andrew was stretched in every way. The School of Theology launched its new programme in September, pressure mounted as teachers dropped out and the Academic Dean was granted leave on medical grounds. Andrew was working on teaching new courses all the while trying to raise the necessary finances to run the school. Praise God for Flor, the new secretary of the school who started in February (part-time), who along with the new FIEIDE Secretary (Tabita) have been a tremendous help and answer to prayer.

Going back

Andrew and Rosalia Elliott took four trips to Spain in 2024. Three were "look and see" visits in relation to possible new ministry locations and one was to be part of an evangelistic team. Towards the end of the year the Department of Evangelism and Mission (DEM) of the Federation of Independent Evangelical Churches in Spain (FIEIDE), that we partner with in Spain, produced a strategy for reaching into an area



to the north-west of Madrid, which is very barren spiritually and where there are very few evangelical churches (which is true of most of Spain).


More prayer and discussion will be needed between the Mission and the DEM, but it looks likely that this is where the Elliotts will re-locate to, hopefully in the summer of 2026.

In the meantime, the plan is for them to continue serving in the Antrim and Dromore churches, visit and take some teams to this part of Spain in 2025/6 and continue taking deputation meetings on behalf of the Mission.

Retirement of Edwin Ewart

Edwin Ewart's link with the College formally began in 1983 when he enrolled as an undergraduate student training for pastoral ministry and has continued ever since. Partnerships

Spurgeon's College

The new validation arrangement agreed with Spurgeon's College, London in 2023 has continued to be a positive experience for the College. More than merely securing the ongoing provision of Higher Education Awards the partnership has provided the opportunity for the College to develop in its own processes and procedures, exercising

freedom and flexibility to enhance provision. This year's Preparation for Ministry graduates were the first to graduate with a degree validated by Spurgeon's College. The prayer is that this partnership might provide stability for the foreseeable future.



Tacna Seminary

The Irish Baptist College has had a long history of partnering with the Seminary in Tacna, Peru. In 2022 the College agreed to accredit a Christian Education Diploma delivered by Seminario Evangélico Bautista Del Sur del Perú. In 2024 the first graduates graduated from this programme, 9 in total




with more to follow in coming years. Partnering with the Seminary has been a great encouragement to the College, and, we trust, a benefit to the cause of the gospel in Tacha and further afield.

Evangelism Teams

In October it was a joy to send small teams of students to serve alongside the Larne, Limavady, and North City (Dublin) churches. Each team engaged in various evangelistic activities, including school ministry, community outreach, special events, and participating in church services. The students returned to the College challenged about their evangelistic zeal and encouraged by the faithful activity of local churches. This partnership is key for all involved.







Accessing Global Voices

Hugh D. Brown Lectures

On Thursday 18th January Ryan Robertson (President, Reaching and Teaching International Ministries) delivered the Hugh D. Brown Lectures—named in honour of the Irish Baptist College's founder. Roberston's title was Global Missions and the Local Church: A Survey of Missions History and a Pathway Forward for Church-Centred Missions. Approximately 50 attendees benefited from this presentation by a leader in contemporary global mission.

Open Lectures

On Wednesday 7th February the College hosted Dr T. Desmond Alexander, a leading voice in Old Testament studies and Biblical Theology. His lectures were delivered under the title *Jesus Christ: Our Perfect High Priest who Offers Himself*. It was a rich reflection on the theme throughout Scripture, with particular attention devoted to Hebrews. Almost 60 people profited from Alexander's expertise.

On Wednesday 18th September the College hosted Pastor Laim Garvie (Associate Pastor, Charlotte Chapel; International Director, The Pillar Network). His lectures were delivered under the title *Developing Leaders: Training for All, Training for Some*. This was a more practically orientated open lecture, encouraging pastors to be intentional in developing future Christian leaders. The appetite for help on such a subject was apparent with approximately 70 people in attendance.

Summer School

The Irish Baptist College's inaugural Summer School took place on Monday 3rd June. Pastor John Bell (Covenanters Christian Church, Harare, Zimbabwe) delivered a stimulating day of teaching on the book of Zechariah. It was an exemplary blend

of close, scholarly attention to the text and warm pastoral exposition and application of the text. Every attendee also received a copy of *Raised According to the Scriptures: Easter in the Old Testament* written by the Director of Training and published only a couple of months earlier. With over 80 people enjoying this inaugural Summer School, the College looks forward to expanding and developing the Summer School programme in coming years.

Developing Evening Class

New Structure and Location

In September the College launched the reshaped evening class. It is now entitled *Foundations: The Basics of Theology* and consists of four five-week modules on a fouryear cycle. Credits towards an award can be gained through attendance at a module and submission of an essay, with the highest award achievable in only two years if the student attends all modules and submits all essays. The option of signing up for a selection of modules that are self-contained has made the course more flexible and thus more attractive, as evidenced by the mushrooming of student numbers to more than 100.

The Foundations course runs in the existing locations of Ballymena, Moira, and Online. It was a particular pleasure, however, to add a new location in September 2024 alongside the redeveloped programme. Foundations is now available in Dublin, with Jamestown Road Baptist serving as host. It is special for the College to resume teaching in the city where it began.

Alongside these courses the College continues to partner with Baptist Women in the delivery of the Women's Disciple Course and Ladies' Study Fellowship.

Irish Baptist Historical Society

Throughout 2024 the Historical Society held three lectures. In March Dr Andrew Curry delivered a lecture entitled 'Has the Story Changed? 400 Years Since the First Anti-Catholic Writing in Ireland' which focussed on the work of James Ussher and reflected on a survey of contemporary views of Association Pastors. In May Dr Trevor Taylor, Dr Paul Harron, and Nigel Younge together delivered a lecture reflecting on the history of Windsor Baptist Church. In October Andrew Roycroft delivered a lecture marking Portadown Baptist Church's Centenary.

Director of Training's Postscript

An annual report does not do justice to all that took place in the life of the College day to day in 2024. The work is not contained primarily in the series of events noted above. It is contained in the conversation held in classrooms, the periods of prayer punctuating the week, the growth of gifts and godliness through the rigours of study and service, the counsel offered alongside caffeine, and the joy of nervous applicants leaving as faithful ambassadors for Christ. These are the moments in which the work of the College is seen most clearly. This is the reason the Irish Baptist College must be cherished by the churches. In the ordinary moments there is a beauty present for those who have eyes to see it—in the mundane pastors, missionaries, evangelists, and gospel workers are formed.

My final word is a personal note of gratitude for Edwin's tenure at the College. Until 2024 I had not known the Irish Baptist College apart from Edwin Ewart, first as my teacher and latterly as a colleague. I am grateful for his influence on me, and his commitment to so many others like me.





Baptist Women






Amazing Journey update



Finance Report Executive Summary

- The year end position is once again encouraging and finishing in surplus for the sixth year in a row.
- Giving from churches was at a level of £853,028, the highest ever level.
- Personal giving fell slightly to £407,340.
- The increase in support has enabled an increase in budgeted expenditure.
- Expenditure of £1,971,796 was £231 under budget.

We continue to give thanks to God for the encouraging levels of church and personal support, which demonstrates a strong commitment to working together and provides a platform for our Association of churches to move forward and develop this vital gospel ministry.


A full independent audit of the statutory accounts is carried out by GMCG Belfast, Chartered Accountants.

Year-end Balance

An examination of the Statement of Financial Activities and Balance Sheet on page 23 will show that the Association budgeted departments recorded a surplus of £8,278 over the year, while the non-budgeted departments added an additional £55,893 surplus, resulting in an overall surplus of £64,171 for the year ended 31 January 2025.

The bank balance at the end of the year increased by £9,906 to £429,908 (Jan-24: £420,002). £190,554 of restricted funds are held for the PIP fund. Taking this into account and adjusting the bank balance accordingly, there is a surplus cash balance of £239,354. This is a drop of £2,878 from the position in January 2024.

The bank balance adjusted in this way at the year-end over a period of years is highlighted in the following graph.



Each year the bank balance is at its highest point at the year end. This is due to a significant proportion of church giving being received in December and January each year. Throughout the year as these funds are put into use the adjusted bank balance typically falls into a deficit position around September, before funds are once again replenished. Our target is to continue to improve the financial position so that the adjusted bank balance remains in surplus throughout the year.


Closing unrestricted reserves of £412,661 represents 2.3 months expenditure for the Association. It is good practice to hold at least 3 months expenditure in reserve. This provides a stable financial base to plan for the work of the Association in future years, with much of these funds already designated to support future work.

The encouraging financial position is evidence that the work of the Association in furthering a Baptist witness in Ireland is held in high regard by our churches and members. We return thanks to God for his faithfulness and goodness.


Church Giving

Church giving in 2024 was at a level of £853,028 an increase of almost 10% on the previous year £803,473). This is the tenth consecutive year of growth in church giving to the work of the Association and the highest ever level. This is once again a significant increase in the level of giving by churches and we are thankful to God for this provision. The following graph highlights church giving to the Association over a 20 year period.





We are very grateful for the generous and faithful support of the churches. This level of giving has significantly exceeded the budget target of £771,350. This level of giving has enabled the Association to ensure that expenditure in the year is covered by income. As in previous years most church giving has been designated to the support of Baptist Missions (£534,192), followed by the College (£155,790).



If giving from churches can remain at the level experienced in 2024 we will meet our budget target for 2025 and will provide the solid platform to enable the work of the Association to continue to move forward.


Church Donations Analysis

The Donations Analysis on pages 25-29 shows that out of 120 churches 106 gave something to the work of the Association. 57 churches increased their giving to the Association while 52 decreased their giving. 16 churches give no financial support. It is once again clear that there are a significant number of churches that have examined their giving to the Association over the past year and have demonstrated their support of the work that we endeavour to do together by increasing their financial support. It is understandable that due to financial pressures some churches have been unable to provide financial support for the work of the Association, however these churches are encouraged to give a nominal amount to each department as an expression of their support.


Personal Donations

Personal donations to the work of the Association decreased by £10,077 from £417,417 in 2023 to £407,340 in 2024.

It is encouraging to see a trend of increasing personal donations to the Association. A large portion of this increase comes as a result of regular monthly giving, which demonstrates the personal commitment of many of our supporters. The College's Gospel Guardian campaign and Baptist Mission's Target 1000 campaign provide essential support as these departments continue in their work of the Gospel. Thanks is given to all the individuals who support the work of the Association in this manner.



As with church giving, most personal donations have been towards Missions and College.



ABCI 2013 Retirement Benefits Scheme

The triennial actuarial valuation carried out on the Scheme at 31 March 2022 showed a funding deficit of £338,000 in the Scheme. Since this valuation the funding position has improved significantly, and the current investment strategy is expected to safeguard against further volatility in the financial markets. The deficit will continue to be met by funding contributions from Association of £30,000 p.a. until June 2027 and is recorded as a liability of the Association on the Balance Sheet.

Thanks must be given to the Directors of ABCI Retirement Benefits Limited which acts as Trustee of the Scheme.

PIP Fund

Churches are continuing to respond positively to the PIP fund subscription. It is planned that this Fund will remain in place until the final member of the Scheme passes away. Contributions are estimated to be payable by churches until 2055. However, it should be noted that the real cost of contributions will not increase and will in fact decrease over time based on the current funding model. The balance on the fund at the year-end is £475,992 with over £250,000 held and invested by the Northern Baptist Corporation Limited on behalf of the Association.

Budget 2025

The Recommended Stipend Scale for 2025 was released to churches with a 4.3% increase for NI churches and 3.9% for ROI. It is for individual churches to assess the level of increase payable in their situation. The Finance Committee approved an increase to Association salaries of 4.3%. The total budgeted expenditure for 2025 is set at £1,996,659. This is an increase of £24,632 on the previous year budget figure of £1,972,027. Church giving needs to reach a level of £814,825 in order to sustain the entirety of the work undertaken by the Association. Church giving exceeded this level in 2024.

Review of the Year

The budget departments collectively finished the year with a surplus balance. A review of each Department shows the complexity of the financial position in 2024.

General Expenses

The General Expense department provides various Administration and Ministry Support services to Association departments and churches. This department has continued to reduce its historical deficit balance, ending the year with a deficit of £33,715 (2023 - £37,687). Income exceeded expenditure in this account by £3,972. Annual subscriptions from churches were at a level of £95,333 (2023 - £88,383). Expenditure was £23,623 higher than in 2023, mainly due to budgeted increase in staff costs. This department funded £20,000 of Pension Administration Costs (2023 - £20,000). The total administration cost of this Pension Scheme is in the region of £30,000 per annum. The Northern Baptist Corporation Limited has committed to funding the balance in order to ease the burden of this liability on the Association.

Baptist Missions

This Department continues to report encouraging financial results. Expenditure increased by £22,663 to £924,573, which was £4,427 under budget. Generous support has seen income increase from by £31,923 to £935,867, resulting in an overall surplus of £11,294 for the year. Church giving increased by £12,784, while personal giving increased by £6,965. It is encouraging to see such high levels of continued church giving and personal donations in support of missionaries and projects, demonstrating the value that our supporters are placing on the work we do as a gospel partnership of churches in Proclaiming Christ and Planting churches. The landscape across France, Ireland, Peru and Spain is so needy that there are many opportunities that need our support.

Baptist Women

The Women's department continues to hold a mix of in-person and online events throughout the year, encouraging participation by women across Ireland. Income exceeded expenditure by £4,812 resulting in a closing surplus for the department of £13,889. Church donations saw an increase of £3,595 to £35,195 although personal giving decreased by £3,087 to £9,410. This closing surplus means Baptist Women is well placed to continue developing their ministry among the women of our churches.

Baptist Youth

The full program BYE Teams and Camps has continued this year. These activities, helped the department finish the year with a surplus of £2,671. Church giving increased by £9,442 although personal giving fell by £7,395. Another successful summer program of camps and teams meant the department was able to meet all of its costs and return a small surplus. Given the importance to our churches of reaching the younger generation maintaining support at this level should be a priority.

Retired Ministers Support

It is encouraging that the historical deficit in this department has now been eliminated. This closing balance was a surplus of £493 (2023 - £339). This fund currently supports 23 members. It has now entered the final stages of its existence and expenditure should continue to fall in coming years.

College

The Irish Baptist College returned a deficit of £15,544 this year, resulting in a closing deficit position of £16,219. The financial impact of smaller student numbers continues to be felt, while this year saw a number of increased costs as a result of the transfer to Spurgeon's. With these additional financial pressures, the College had budgeted to finish the year with a deficit of £35k so it is encouraging to only be faced with a deficit of £15k for the year. This is largely due to increases in both church (+£29,597) and personal (+£10,528) support. Church giving exceeded the budget target by £20,790. Financial pressures remain a source of concern for forthcoming years, and churches are encouraged to support the College primarily by identifying and sending students with a calling and gifting for ministry to train at the College. Given the vital and strategic work of the College and the impact on our churches it is imperative that the college is given the support it requires as it seeks to prepare leaders for gospel ministry in pastoral and missionary settings.

Churches' Pastoral Support Scheme

It was encouraging to see continued support for the CPSS. The fund closed with a £3,733 surplus at the year end. The level of giving once again enabled 100 percent of the promised grants to be passed to the six churches currently in the Scheme. The impact on a small church of having someone in place to lead the work forward cannot be underestimated. Support of this fund is commended to the churches.

Insight Magazine

The Insight Magazine account continues to operate at a deficit of approximately £5,000 a year and looks to the Northern Baptist Corporation Limited for support. This is as a result of a slow decline in subscriptions as a result of the challenges that printed media face in a digital age. The magazine is one of the main channels of disseminating information from our churches and Association departments and requires support in promoting the magazine. The Editorial Committee believes that the magazine is an excellent product that deserves support.

Baptist Aid

Throughout 2024 we continued to support the vital work of the Baptist Union of Zimbabwe Orphan Care Programme. Income exceeded costs by £142 leaving this department's deficit at £1,273. Churches are encouraged to continue to support this life giving project.
